




## Area Map and Access

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## <sup>5</sup> Horaisan Toshogu

The shrine was built in 1651 by Iemitsu, the third Shogun of the Tokugawa Shogunate. The god of worship is the samurai Tokugawa Ieyasu, whose family ruled Japan for over 200 years. It is a nationally designated Important Cultural Property.



## Horaiji Hondo (Main Temple)

As the head temple of the Gochi Order within the Shingon Sect, this sacred site enshrines Yakushi Nyorai. Mysterious remains of Rishu Sennin's 'oni' assistants were unintentionally discovered when the Hondo underwent reconstruction in 1974. The remains are still buried under the building to this day.





### Scenic Lookouts 7

The volcanic history of Mt. Horaiji has produced natural rocky lookouts with views to the ocean and even the Southern Alps.

Takauchiba (left) was a site of falconry in the Edo period, a 30 minute walk from Toshogu Shrine along the Tokai Nature Trail.

Mt. Ruri Summit (right) is a highlight of the Summit Circuit, less than 5 minutes walk from the Mt. Horaiji Summit. Take in stunning panoramic views from a ridge of ancient volcanic rock.



## Omotesando (Temple Street)

Main streets leading to temples and shrines are called 'Omotesando,' and at Mt. Horaiji the Omotesando leads to the base of the 1,425 stone steps. As the main path to reach the mountain for over 1,300 years, this quaint area has deep history and traces of the visitors that came to see Mt. Horaiji and its temples for centuries. At its peak in the Edo Period, there were many inns and even a





# 'Kagami-Iwa' (Mirror Rock)

The face of Mt. Horaiji, this magnificent rock wall is 70m high and 250m wide. The mountain's Bell Tower is nestled in the forest at the base of the cliff.

## <sup>3</sup> Kasasugi

Kasasugi is a Japanese Cedar tree, roughly 60 meters high and estimated to be over 800 years old. Kasasugi is the second tallest 'sugi' tree in Japan and has been selected as one of the 100 best trees in the country. Each year the rice grass rope is replaced in a ceremony to celebrate Kasasugi as a deity.



Just a brief 10 minute stroll from the base of the 1,425 stone steps, stands the remarkable main temple gate. Constructed in 1651, it holds the designation of National Important Cultural Property.
